Actions	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Reconsideration of “Revisions and Confidentiality Determinations for Data Elements Under the Greenhouse Gas Reporting Rule” (89 FR 31802; April 25, 2024); and• Reconsideration of “Mandatory Reporting of Greenhouse Gases” (74 FR 56260; October 30, 2009) and all later rules that have amended this one.
Reasons for Actions	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Information Collection Requests should be reevaluated periodically to ensure that they continue to align with the requirements of the Paperwork Reduction Act, adhere to all applicable laws, and are consistent with Administration policy.• Revisions to this rule would address specific issues raised by industry stakeholders to improve the accuracy of the annual greenhouse gas emission estimates for the landfill sector.• It is possible that other revisions to GHGRP as a whole can be made to streamline the reporting requirements across other sectors in the program to find efficiencies and lower burden on reporters.
Important facts on regulation/program	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Cost estimates of over \$690 million (\$46 million per year) and does not include the oil and natural gas sector located within 40 C.F.R. Part 98, Subpart W (addressed in a separate fact sheet).• Applies to approximately 5,700 regulated entities.• The GHGRP applies to certain large industrial facilities emitting 25,000 metric tons or more of CO₂ equivalent (CO₂e) GHG emissions per year; CO₂ injection sites (i.e., carbon capture and sequestration); and to most upstream suppliers, including importers and exporters of fossil fuels and industrial GHGs.
