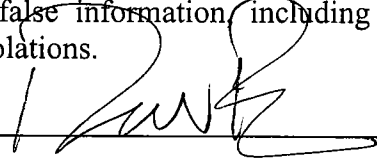

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6.0 POST CONSTRUCTION STORM WATER MANAGEMENT

6.1 Activities Conducted

This information was not tracked this year. Activities conducted and their method of tracking will largely be determined by the regulatory mechanisms developed to address post-construction runoff controls.

6.2 Modifications to SWMP

At this time, no changes to the SWMP are necessary.

6.3 Activities Planned Next Year

Activities planned for next year are outlined in the SWMP. More detailed information will be gathered and presented in the next Annual Report.

7.0 POLLUTION PREVENTION/GOOD HOUSEKEEPING

7.1 Public Works Overview

The Southborough Department of Public Works consists of a Water Division, a Cemetery Division, a Tree Division, and a Highway Division. Available employees from all divisions are engaged in snow clearing. It is important to note that there are only five full time employees to conduct sign maintenance, street and sidewalk cleaning, catch basin cleaning, street maintenance (patching), and roadside mowing. These staff are engaged not only in snow clearing, but also are engaged in assisting in manning the transfer station (overtime), transporting refuse trailers from the transfer station to Wheelabrator Millbury, street striping, culvert maintenance, and responding to resident complaints. Excluding transfer station disposal costs and overtime, the operating budget for this fiscal year was just over \$786,000.

7.2 Employee Training Conducted

Eighteen (18) Public Works staff, representing administrative, cemetery, highway, and water staff, attended training this year. The training included Right to Know, Hazard Communication, Spill Prevention and Response, and Storm Water Pollution Prevention training.

7.3 Street Sweeping

DPW staff conducted continuous street sweeping. Each street was swept at least once during the year. Close to 520 tons of materials was collected. This year curb miles were not tracked.

7.4 Catch Basin Cleaning

A total of 410 basins have been cleaned to date. This resulted in over 40 truckloads (over 60 tons estimated) of material removed.

7.5 Preventive Maintenance

DPW staff conducted weekly inspections of: waste oil tanks, waste oil handling areas, gasoline dispenser, tank covers, and stage 2 vapor recovery systems.

7.6 Complaint Responses

DPW staff responded to twelve (12) complaints involving blocked catch basins and swales. DPW staff also responded to fifteen (15) complaints concerning street flooding. Five litter complaints were resolved. Five complaints were associated with the drainage system involving wash outs and sink holes.

7.7 Transfer Station

Over 5,100 tons of residential waste was collected at the Transfer Station and disposed at Wheelabrator Millbury.

Close to 500 tons of newspaper was collected. Over 300 tons of commingled materials were recycled. Close to 220 tons of white goods and scrap metal was recycled. 0.14 tons of batteries were reclaimed. 42 tons of CRTs were recycled. 0.005 tons of mercury containing items were properly disposed. Over 530 tons of leaves and brush were composted. Close to 2 tons of redeemable cans were donated to charity.

7.8 Household Hazardous Waste Collection

Hazardous Waste Collection was conducted in October 2003. This was funded by the Town through a warrant article and conducted by the Board of Health. The following materials were collected and properly disposed: 856 gallons of pesticides, poisons, and cleaners; 275 gallons of paint; 160 gallons of alkaline batteries; 110 gallons of aerosol products; and 5 gallons of mercury containing devices.

7.9 Modification to the SWMP

At this time, no changes to the SWMP are necessary.

7.10 Activities Planned Next Year

Activities planned for next year are outlined in the SWMP. More detailed information will be gathered and presented in the next Annual Report.

Water hearing slated for tonight

SOUTHBOROUGH

SOUTHBOROUGH - Residents will soon see cleaner waterways surrounding their homes thanks to a five-year federal program which will be implemented locally over the next five years.

A forum tonight at 7:30 at Town Hall will give the public a chance to view how that will be accomplished.

Designed by the Environmental Protection Agency in 1999, the Phase II Storm Water program is intended to reduce pollution in waterways of more than 250 urban areas.

"Southborough is included in this because of our proximity to Boston to the east and Worcester to the west," said Peter Bemis, chairman of Southborough's storm water committee.

Urban areas are those near a community of 50,000 or more and have a population of 1,000 people per square mile. Tonight's forum is the last opportunity for public comment before the committee submits its plan to the EPA, Bemis said.

"We hope to get input and provide a better understanding of what the program is all

about," he said.

Bemis said each plan must identify six measures: public education and outreach, public involvement/participation, discharge detection and elimination, construction site runoff control, post construction runoff control and pollution prevention.

The most important out of the six is public education and outreach, Bemis said. Instead of cleaning up the pollution already in the water systems, the hope is to reduce the overall amount seeping into the water.

"Our waterways are one of the greatest assets of Southborough," Bemis said. "They are central to the core of the whole town. The first thing when people come to Southborough, they comment on the waterways."

The plan also increases the number construction projects subject to review by the EPA. Under Phase II, any construction activities disturbing one acre of land needs a permit.

Phase I of the EPA's storm water program established regulations for municipalities with populations of 100,000 or greater and with construction activities disturbing five or more acres, Bemis said.

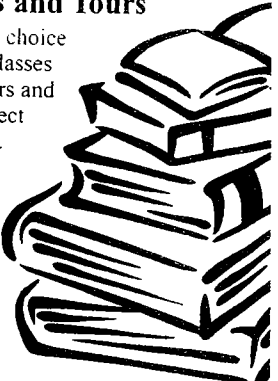

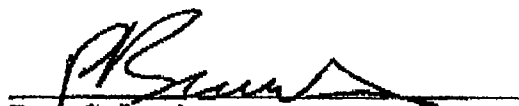
