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Part II. Self-Assessment

The Town of Monson has continued implementing the Measurable Goals noted in Monson's Notice of Intent for coverage under the 2003 NPDES Small MS4 General Permit. Monson is pleased to present the following summary describing the Town's success at implementing the fifteenth year of the Comprehensive Stormwater Management Program, defined as April 2017 through March 2018.

The Town has noted the issuance of the 2016 revised Small MS4 General Permit and the ongoing litigation by various parties regarding the 2016 MS4 Permit. The Town will monitor the EPA Website for updates regarding the current implementation date of July 1, 2019 as well as any changes to permit requirements in order to identify the highest priority compliance issues. The Town intends to prepare a Notice of Intent for coverage under the revised General Permit.

In addition, the Town has been investigating the purchase of a hazardous waste dump area that could be used by residents. The finalization of this purchase is dependent on information from Mass DEP regarding grant funding availability for disposal of hazardous waste. Recycling of household waste is promoted through curbside pickup by a contractor. The recycling schedule is posted on the Town Website. Execution of the storm drain stenciling program developed during Permit Year 7 was substantially completed during Permit Year 8. Stencils displaying the words “Dump No Waste, Drains to Waterways” and a fish symbol were applied to the majority of catch basins in the Town. However, this stenciling is beginning to fade. During this reporting period, the Town continued to replace existing catch basin grates with grates that have the message “Dump No Waste, Drains to Waterways” permanently cast into the grate. This will eliminate the need for repeated stenciling. The Town upgraded 4 catch basins on Main Street with these improved grates during the reporting period. This work will continue into the upcoming reporting year.

In addition, Earth Day clean-up is advertised by the Town in the online trash/recycling schedule, local newspapers, with a banner over Main Street, on the local access channel and on the Town website. In the past year, the Town initiated two additional efforts regarding cleanup and disposal. First, the Town has subsidized the purchase of home yard composters for purchase by residents at a discounted rate. As described below, the Town continues to inventory outfalls and catchbasins on an annual basis and implement improvements as needed (see BMPs 15, 23, and 24).

The Monson Highway Department continues to maintain catch basins. Highway Department staff recorded the cleaning of 12 catch basins during this reporting period. During cleanout the workers note the condition of the structure and report any suspected problems for additional assessment. In addition, any blockage or sediment buildup in pipes associated with these catch basins was noted In Permit Year 15, no issues were noted and therefore jet cleaning was not needed.</p> <p>Eight catch basins were repaired during the reporting period, including basins on Main Street, State Avenue, and Washington Street.</p> <p>Street sweeping is performed by Town staff twice yearly, in the spring and fall, and when necessary after storm events. Debris is disposed in accordance with current guidelines. The Highway Department keeps a log of street sweeping, including dates and street names. The Town estimates 75% of their paved roads were swept during the reporting period, with the focus on roads that have drainage infrastructure which discharge near or directly to waterways. Approximately 731 cubic yards of material was collected during sweeping in the past year</p> <p>The Town’s Snow Plowing policy has been formalized and is posted on the Town website. Highway Department employees are re-trained regularly on vehicle maintenance practices and appropriate outside storage of sand, salt, and other materials.</p>
